#### DISCUSSION GROUPS

- A. Federal Policy and Funding for Liberal Arts Colleges. Discuss this with Ida Wallace. She knows about what is happening at NSF and the new Department of Education; she wants to learn about your experiences with granting agencies. (Located near group B. so you can attend both easily.)
- B. Writing Proposals and Getting Them Funded. Talk with MACTLAC people who have grants for research, course development, departmental development. Brian Andreen will discuss Research Corporation programs with you.
- C. Literature Searching. Lockheed Information Systems will provide an on-line system for you to try. (Come early and try it Friday morning, too.) Diane Yoder from Chemical Abstracts and Kris Ewing from the Institute of Paper Chemistry will join Joe DiSalvo from Lockheed to discuss computer search techniques for you and your students.
- D. Laboratory Safety and Health. Consult with Prof. Gaines from the Univ. of Wisconsin and with MACTLAC members who have established programs of their own. Regulations, toxic waste disposal, student and faculty instruction.
- E. Industrial Chemistry. If it goes into the organic course, what comes out? If not, what does a separate course look like? We have MACTLAC members who now teach or are developing such courses. Come learn from them.
- F. Small Computer Program Exchange: A "Presidential Workshop." John Zimmerman, MACTLAC president, is bringing his personal computer and programs he has developed for it. Bring your personal computer or microprocessor to demonstrate, your successful programs and applications to share with others.
- G. Off-Campus Experience and Career Choices. What traditional and nontraditional opportunities exist off-campus? Do they replace or supplement on-campus research? Do they help provide effective career counseling? John Biester, Beloit's Director of Career Counseling and Field Placement, and Jerry Baird of Argonne's Center for Educational Affairs are resources.
- H. Instrumentation. It was once reserved for Instrumental Methods and now is in organic, quant, and general chemistry. How much? When? How sophisticated?
- I. Biochemistry and Biology: Where to Draw the Line? What luck have you had coordinating your course content with that in Biology? What about course pre-requisites between departments? Any joint research? Joint seminars?
- J. Learning to Teach and Teaching to Learn. Join Marjorie Gardner to discuss the issues she raises in her talk. Bassam Shakhashiri, familiar to many from last year's meeting, will respond as a recent MCA Award winner and as one doing research in teaching chemistry at the Univ. of Wisconsin.
- K. Organometallic Chemistry. Does this growing area belong in the organic course, in the inorganic course, or only in graduate school?
- L. Preparation for General Chemistry. Is the nationally heralded decline in basic skills a testing anomoly or an increasing problem for us all?
- M. So You Want to Write a Book. Discuss what is really involved with some of MACTLAC's successful authors.
